Dear Friend,



Brush your teeth! Many of you have probably heard that message or been sharing it with family members over the years. But for me growing up poor in rural lowa, going to the dentist was a luxury. I recall going to the dentist twice when I was a child when things had reached an emergency status. My mother told me to brush my teeth, of course, but the first time I heard the words "oral hygiene" was from my fourth-grade teacher during health class. And I sure didn't know anyone who had braces!

The same lack of awareness about the importance of oral health to one's overall health and well-being still exists today, and it is one reason why lowa CareGivers' Mouth Care Matters (MCM) program, developed in 2014, is one of our strongest and most impactful programs. The hands-on training program was initially designed for direct care workers (DCWs) such as certified nursing assistants, home care aides, direct support professionals, hospice aides and other DCWs who provide 80-90% of the direct hands-on care to lowans of all ages and abilities in nursing homes, hospitals, group homes, the homes of persons served, and other settings. Most of those who completed the training had no idea that a "dirty mouth" could lead to heart disease and even aspiration pneumonia, a leading cause of death in nursing home residents. Graduates of the program indicated that they were going to make changes in their personal oral hygiene habits because of what they had learned.

MCM was made possible through a collaborative effort between many committed partners. Start-up and ongoing funding has been provided by Delta Dental of Iowa Foundation (DDIF); the Public Health Division of the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services provided funding to develop the MCM curriculum; the University of Iowa Colleges of Nursing and Dentistry developed the curriculum; dental hygienists were trained to provide the MCM instruction; and Iowa CareGivers coordinated and administered the activities which included working with community colleges to pilot the MCM classes. Mid-Iowa Health Foundation (MIHF) and the RRF Foundation for Aging also provided funding to advance this important work.

MCM was deemed a best practice by the National Rural Health Association, and when MCM was used as an intervention project by the University of lowa, nursing home residents where at least 50% of the certified nurse aides (CNAs) received MCM training demonstrated marked improvements in their oral health. It is vital that DCWs are equipped with the skills and knowledge to ensure that older lowans and people with disabilities receive the best oral care possible.

The initiative also includes an employer MCM implementation toolkit on how to create a care culture that fully integrates oral health into their practices.

The MCM program, led by Iowa CareGivers, provides practical, handson skills and knowledge on how to provide the best oral care possible for Iowans of all ages and abilities and prepares providers with tools to operationalize oral health best practices.

As a committed partner, the Foundation has invested more than \$354,000 since 2014 to advance training efforts, revise with new learnings, and increase the impact of the MCM program throughout the state. Most recently, a \$25,000 grant was awarded to support integration into several systems including community colleges, The University of Iowa College of Dentistry and the College of Nursing, therefore creating greater understanding by Iowans of the importance of oral care to overall health and wellness. This aligns with the Foundation's mission to strengthen and transform the health and smiles of all Iowans and ensure oral health, including vulnerable older adults, is a priority for all Iowans."

As lowa CareGivers continues our work that is vital to the future of our communities, state, and society, we are so grateful to have our most generous and loyal supporters like you alongside us.
